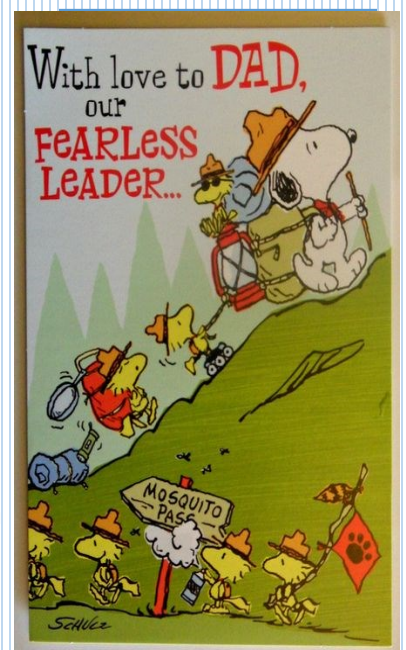

It is a direct reflection of you. A reminder: A trauma patient can become hypothermic in hot weather. Hypothermia leads to Coagulopathy-Acidosis, and that can happen in a trauma patient. Keep' em warm! You will be uncomfortable, but it is in the patient's best interest. Your goal is a great patient outcome.

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# Hickory/St. Clair News

The month of May has been challenging this year. From the silly, “Why did you call for an ambulance?” to the TCD and life threatening calls. Nothing really new for EMS as a whole; there just seems to be more of the extreme spectrum that has occurred.

Everyone is busy in ALL the counties. Please keep this in mind as patients may have delayed care as they wait for an ambulance from another county or service. When you drop off a patient at the ER, get back in service as soon as you can. Keep your trucks fueled. Yes, I understand you may be fueling them several times a shift, but we need to do our part in helping keep our communities and service areas taken care of.

Neal would like for us to focus on keeping our ambulances and equipment clean. If you are having a slow day, then I expect to see that your ambulance, station, and the end of shift duties have been done. Check the notebook and see what the previous crew was not able to get done on their shift and be a team player and help them out. Even though equipment appears to be clean, I have been spot checking and have found dried blood on cots, the monitor, and other equipment.

We also need to change our vocabulary when it comes to patients and informing them that their condition can be managed or taken care of at the local clinic and/or that you are comfortable with them going POV. This is an EMTALA violation. We need to inform patients that they need to be transported by ambulance to the ER. If they refuse, then document, document, document. Please include and list ALL risk of refusal that was discussed in your narrative and patient’s response. Please just don’t type in “patient was informed of risk of refusal.” I would like to actually see what those risks were given and noted in your narrative.

The lakes are already staying busy with fishing, tubing, skiing, etc. Department wide, we work several boating accidents every year. Know where your life jackets are kept on the truck! And, it wouldn’t hurt to inspect them and make sure they are useable. If they are not, please let me know ASAP.

This summer is going to be busy with vacations and standby events. We have been struggling to keep both shifts and standbys covered by not only ALS providers, but also BLS. I am asking that everyone pitch in and help lighten the load where you can. We have a very small core group of employees that consistently help keep shifts covered. All 3 managers for our department would appreciate any help you can offer in any station.

Neal has put out the email that we will be going back to only 1 paramedic approved off work at a time. If you already have an approved request off, you are good to go. If not, please double check and make sure that there is not already someone off work PRIOR to buying and purchasing any non-refundable tickets or vacations.

I would like to see everyone pitch in and help out with Lucas Oil Speedway this year. No, it is not mandatory, but it is the right thing to do when we have so many open shifts. I don’t expect these two stations to cover seven months of Lucas Oil, but would like to see all Medics work a couple this year. **Aaron Weaver, Amanda Dickover, Rob Hutson, John Fraser, Tom Liberty, and Jay Fry:** Thank you for your help in April and May.

Please keep an eye on your email, as there have been several go out from Cox over Landing Zones, change in location for Collins Landing Zone, and the new Fuelman fuel cards. I have been trying to make sure emails are forwarded to each of you and passing along information at shift change or when I see you.

## June 2018 Health and Safety Newsletter

The summer months are here! Plenty of light and plenty of showers. Drink up to stay hydrated. Don't wait on feeling thirsty to tell you need to drink.

Throughout the spring I have really been able to witness the fast growth of grass, flowers, trees, and weeds between the showers and sunshine. It's truly amazing what can grow when the conditions are right. The other interesting, and often frustrating thing, about soil is that something will come out of it. Whether or not you plant seeds. There will be things that grow. The cheesy, but true, analogy I'm about to put forth is that your life is like the soil. You are growing with your own habits, skills, strengths, and weaknesses. When it comes to our job of providing safe, exceptional, compassionate care to all people we care for, what habits and practices are you cultivating? What are you allowing to grow in your work? Are there "weeds" or "vines" that don't help you provide safe, exceptional, compassionate care? What should you "plant" in your professional practice so that it can grow and develop and be passed on to others?

On a more specific health note; I met with the infection prevention committee in late May and they would like to see how often we clean our ambulances. This is pretty easy for us to show them and will not put more load on the managers, if you fill out the Google Ambulance cleaning form <https://goo.gl/forms/nckK3n160EeRk0E162> whenever you clean your ambulance. I have been noticing that ambulances are not getting cleaned well. Cleaning the ambulances is something that not only helps the ambulance look good, but keeps us and patient's safer with less likelihood of passing on diseases to each other.

On the topic of safety; I just want to remind everyone to be using all the cot straps. This has often been a neglected part of patient care, but needs to become a standard part of patient care. All of our cots have shoulder straps and must be used on every patient, no matter how short or critical the transport. One of the main ways we can do no harm to our patients is to protect them from accidents, such as a hard stop or a crash that could permanently injure them or kill them because they were not restrained properly. You can prevent patient injury or death by taking the extra few seconds to put all the straps on. Please wear your seatbelt and put all the seat-belts on your patients.

Enjoy all the heat and sunshine June has to offer!

Please continue to perform your responsibilities of cleaning and disinfecting ambulances and equipment. This form is designed for tracking of deep cleaning, which is not normally done after a call. However, if you did a top, exterior, or other equipment and then clean it, you can document it with this form. Please refer to the Ambulance Cleaning policy (PH001-08) and your stations cleaning rotation schedule. Thanks for taking PRIDE in your work.

# Scheduling Guidelines for Google Calender & Open Shifts

Managers are going to try something different to try and free up and save us some time. If this works, we will continue to do this. Right now, this will be on a trial basis only.

Each new schedule will be loaded onto the Google Calendar SIX weeks prior to start date, showing all available open shifts. We will continue doing this to where there will be 12 weeks at any given time showing on the Google schedule calendar.

Employees will need to be PROACTIVE and RESPONSIBLE for picking up shifts to meet the minimum requirements for their job during the 6 week schedule. (PRN: Three shifts and/or standbys a schedule)

## **These open shifts will be available to be picked up or shift bid on in the following order:**

1. PRN (up to 39 hours per pay period) and PT Employees (up to 60 hours per pay period) Give and take on both of these.
2. FT employees in the Paramedic class – Polk County Employees extra shift needs to be on your short week side where you are only scheduled 3 shifts.
3. All Fulltime employees- Polk County Employees the extra shift needs to start on your short week side where you are scheduled three shifts for the week.

Once the schedule is loaded onto Google Calendar, the open shifts will be available first come, first serve to all PRN and PT employees until the paper schedule is emailed out.

After the paper schedule comes out, then FT employees in the Paramedic class may pick up **one shift per pay period**. You will be allowed one week to get this done. *Polk County Employees:* Extra shift needs to start on your short week side where you are only scheduled three shifts.

After the Paramedic student staff has had their chance, all employees PRN, PT, or FT may pick up anything else that is left open.

## **To search for open shifts on the Google Calendar:**

1. Go to the search bar at the top of your Google Calendar and type in Open ALS or Open BLS and it should pull up in a list all the open shifts that are available.
2. Contact that station manager to be added to the schedule.

## **RULES:**

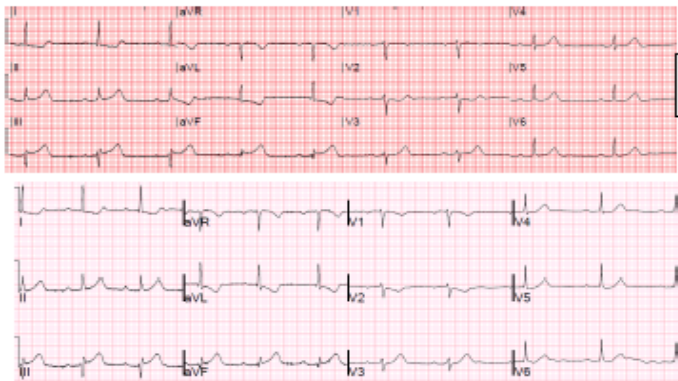
- \* To start with, please do not ask for any back to back shifts that have little to no down time between the shifts or split shifts
- \* Please do not request any 48's in the 24 stations or split shifts.
- \* Managers will address back to back shifts, shift splits, or 48's on a "need to basis" in order to maintain shift coverage.
